Get Busy Living or Get Busy Dying

As I was coming home from a great AANA Annual Meeting in San Francisco this week, I rode a transport van from Hartsfield in Atlanta to Macon. Getting on the van I notice an older man with a little girl whom I guessed was his granddaughter. They sat closely together and one could tell they loved one another. Upon a closer look I noticed the man had labored breathing and was wheeling around an oxygen concentrator and wearing nasal cannula. He was skinny, looked to be in his early 60's, and was wearing a NASCAR baseball cap. The van was packed with travelers and we had to be re-seated in order to fit in all of the luggage. As he got in and out of the van I couldn't take my eyes off of him because his breathing became more labored, and he pulled out an Albuterol puffer and gave himself a couple of puffs. His young granddaughter, who couldn't have been more than 7 or 8, took no real notice. She was obviously used to this type of occurrence. I on the other hand, I was alarmed. I first thought, "This guy is going to code, and I'm going to have to administer CPR!" My second thought was, "I would not put this fella to sleep for anything ... maybe regional if it were an extremity!"

Then I looked at the big picture and imagined the scenario if it were me. This loving grandfather is taking his princess on one last trip before he dies. He knows his time here on earth is limited. He wants one last trip with the jewel of his world. His wish is for her memories to be filled with the wonderful time they spent together. Just her and her grandfather spending time together will be much more precious than any material gift he could leave her. I achieved some peace thinking that.

As I am witnessing this, a famous line from the Shawshank Redemption is beating in my head. Morgan Freeman's character is facing being a free man after decades of being in jail. He has become used to being the big man in jail and now is bagging groceries and living in a half-way house. As he faces change and mortality his epiphany is inspiring, Get Busy Living, or Get Busy Dying.

We as CRNA's are facing a similar, slower, less dramatic situation. Or profession is not in such jeopardy, but we could do some things to improve and grow. The following are guidelines I live by to strive to be the best, most equitable CRNA. Keep in mind this is a process, and like anyone, I may not be the best at what I do, but I try.

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From the Executive Director

On August 8, 2012, Janice Izlar assumed the role of AANA President. Her inauguration occurred seventy (70) years after Rosalie McDonald served as AANA President. Janice and Ms. McDonald are the only two (2) CRNAs from Georgia to serve in this capacity thus far. Both ladies were strong leaders of GANA before assuming their roles at the national level. GANA is a stronger organization because of their commitment and leadership to nurse anesthesia. Congratulations Janice! Your GANA colleagues commend you and support you. Thank you for all you have done.

Regulatory Issues

CMS – The AANA has requested state participation in responding to the proposed CMS rules that would reinstate CRNA reimbursement for pain management services. GANA has submitted comments to CMS in support of the proposed rule. Further, GANA has asked several organizations to submit comments in support of the rules. These organizations include: Georgia Alliance of Community Hospitals, Georgia Board of Nursing, Georgia Rural Health Association, and Georgia Nurses Association. Individual CRNAs should also submit comments and can do so online by going to the following website: www.protectmypaincare.com

GCMB - The Georgia Composite Board of Medicine has published proposed rules related to telemedicine. The language in the proposed rules requires that a physician must see the patient in person or provide an initial consultation by way of electronic means before an APRN can provide care to a patient electronically. This requirement restricts the scope of practice of APRNs. There is no other situation under Georgia law whereby an APRN cannot provide care to a patient until the physician has seen the patient. If approved as proposed, the GCMB would impose a new restriction on nursing practice. It primarily affects APRNS other than CRNAs. GANA will monitor this situation. The comment period is currently open until August 31st.

OIG ADVISORY OPINION – In May 2012, the OIG issued an advisory opinion regarding two different contractual arrangements between anesthesia providers and physicians and outpatient surgery centers. Although the opinion applies only to these two specific situations, you can be guided by it nonetheless. If you are in the business of contracting anesthesia services to medical provider practices, you may want to familiarize yourself with OIG Advisory Opinion No. 12-06. Below is a brief summary.

Under the first arrangement, the anesthesia provider would continue to serve as the exclusive anesthesia provider for several outpatient anesthesia surgery centers, and begin paying the centers for management services on a per-patient fee basis, excluding Federal health care program patients. The OIG reiterated its long-standing concern about arrangements which 'carve out' Federal health care program patients. The opinion stated that in this situation there was a risk the anesthesia provider would be paying the management fee to induce the

centers referral of all of its patients, including Federal health care patients.

Under the second arrangement, the physician owners of surgery centers would create separate subsidiary companies for the purpose of providing anesthesia services to patients having surgery at a center. The anesthesia provider would be engaged by the physician owners as the exclusive anesthesia provider and be paid a negotiated rate for anesthesia services. The anesthesia provider rate would be paid from collections with the subsidiary retaining any profits. This particular arrangement has the possibility of being protected by the ASC safe harbor for the relationship between a surgery center and physician office. In this particular scenario, however, because the subsidiary was created for the purpose of providing anesthesia services, it would not provide surgical services and could not qualify for protection of the ASC safe harbor. Again, the OIG reiterated one of its long-standing concerns that the opportunity for a referring physician to earn a profit through the investment in an entity where the physician generates business could constitute an illegal inducement under the anti-kickback statute. The OIG opined that under this proposed arrangement the physician owners would be receiving compensation in the form of a portion of the anesthesia provider's service revenues in return for referrals from the anesthesia providers. It would thus be a disguised payment for referrals, which violates the anti-kickback statute.

It can be difficult to know what contractual arrangements are legal versus which ones are problematic. If you are involved in these business arrangements it would be prudent to seek legal advice and counsel. Be careful out there.

Vote Smart!

his is an election year as you well know and the time has come for us to elect a new President. I implore you to research the candidates and vote smart! Healthcare is "swinging in the wind" so to speak, and we need some definite intervention to protect our practice.

The GANA has been monitoring the Centers for Medicare/ Medicaid Services (CMS) as it relates to CRNA reimbursement rule for pain management. The GANA has submitted comments in response to proposed rules for 2013. These rules will affect many rural Georgians ability to receive pain management services.

The Department of Health and Human Services Office of Inspector General (HHS-OIG) recently issued its opinion on the "Company Model." This opinion addresses anesthesia service arrangements in physician owned facilities. You may hear it referred to as the "Anti-Kick Back Statue." In these times of reduced reimbursement and other hardships, anesthesia providers may feel the need to provide enticements

for potential stakeholders in return for anesthesia services/ business. Please know that adopting this type of practice is illegal and may be considered fraud. The consequences of such actions are enormous, and may include fines and incarceration. Please consult legal counsel when you are negotiating contracts in the business of anesthesia services.

Also, please remember the GANA Fall Annual Meeting in Savannah Georgia being held October 5-7, 2012. Please attend and also consider the GANA-PAC event.

Protect My Pain Care

rist things first, I need to take a moment to congratulate my good friend and mentor, Janice Izlar, the 2012-2013 AANA President from Savannah. Yes, not since Rosalie McDonald in 1942 has the AANA had a President from Georgia. I have had the honor of personally knowing and working with Janice since 2006. I have no question Janice will serve us all well. She possess all of the qualities important for a leader; vision, integrity, magnanimity, humility, openness, creativity, fairness, assertiveness and perhaps the most important, patience. She listens to all sides and doesn't form an opinion prematurely without first having all of the facts. I look forward to working with Janice as Georgia's Federal Political Director (FPD) and an AANA Government Relations Committee member. There will be a total of 5 of us from Georgia serving on AANA committees during President Izlar's term; Rose Synsmir (program), Kay Argroves (practice), Martha Kral (Peer Advisors), and Leslie Jeter (Program Chair and AANA Liaison to the AORN Recommended Practices Advisory Board).

As your FPD I have been working diligently for several months now to get the word out concerning the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) proposed rule that would restore direct reimbursement for CRNA chronic pain management services. It is critical that this proposed rule by the CMS stays! The rule involves access to pain care, particularly in rural areas of Georgia and the ability for all of us to practice our full scope of services within state law. Pain management is within the scope of practice for a CRNA and in compliance with the laws of the State of Georgia.

The GANA has written a letter to the CMS and contacted the Georgia Board of Nursing, Georgia Nurses Association, Georgia Alliance of Community Hospitals, the Coalition of Advanced Practice of Registered Nurses and the Georgia Rural Health Association asking them for their support. I have also contacted our Georgia Key Contacts urging them to contact all of our 15 Federal Legislators asking them to write letters in support. Lastly, the GANA, along with the AANA contacted every one of you asking for your support by writing the CMS. Please, if you have not yet written a letter to the CMS go to www. protectmypaincare.com and do so. The cutoff is September 4th for all communications.

Please don't be so naïve as to think just because you don't practice pain management that this doesn't affect you. It does! It's about maintaining our scope of practice. If we all do not remain united on scope of practice issues, one by one they will be taken away from us. When you are contacted by the AANA or GANA to act on an issue involving a regulatory or legislative issue please do so for the sake of our practice, our patients and their access to care and our future.

Other Federal issues of interest that have been on the back burner are (i) Legislation has been reintroduced to restore Medicare rural hospital CRNA "on call" services reimbursement; (ii) House panel cuts nurse, allied health workforce funds; and (iii) Party divide emerges in Congress over drug shortages. Remember, this is an election year and the AANA needs your dollars in order to ensure that those incumbent legislators friendly to our cause stay in office and those newly running for office have the best opportunity for being elected. 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Georgia Health Sciences University's Nurse Anesthesia Program Report

he Board of Regents has spoken and the new name for the new university formed from the merger of Georgia Health Sciences University (GHSU) and Augusta State University (ASU) is Georgia Regents University. Current President of GHSU Dr. Azziz will be the President of the new university and had the following to say after the name was released: "With a strong show of confidence, the BOR gave name to Georgia's nascent fourth comprehensive research university. A university that from day one will have over 9,500 students, more than 5,000 staff, over 1,000 faculty, over 150 buildings, 650 acres of campus, nine colleges, and an aligned health system, forming part of the state's only public Academic Health Center (AHC). A university that will have state-wide reach, and will strive to have national and global relevance in becoming one of America's great universities. An institution that already injects over \$2 Billion dollars (that's Billion with a 'B') yearly into the local economy and, with its planned growth over the next 8 years, will eventually be having a greater than \$3 Billion annual economic impact into the local community... And much, much more into the Georgia and South Carolina economies".

The students of the Class of 2012 have begun their last clinical semester and anxiously await their December graduation. Students of the Class of 2013 are gladly making the transition from the classroom to the clinical setting and are both excited and nervous as they embark upon the task of taking their textbook knowledge and utilizing it in the clinical setting. Their departure from the classroom opened the door for the 20 students of the Class of 2014, which arrived on campus August 16th for orientation. I often reflect back on the excitement and fear of the first day of

anesthesia training, and now twenty something years later still thinking it was one of the best decisions I ever made. That excitement and fear will rapidly be replaced by the realization that there is a lot of information covered in what often appears to be not enough time and the year will be gone before they know it.

All paperwork for the collaboration between GHSU and the Medical Center of Central Georgia (MCCG) has been officially approved and signed by both institutions. In the next few weeks paperwork will be submitted to the Council of Accreditation to make MCCG one of GHSU's clinical sites with anticipation of sending the first students there for clinical rotation in January 2013. The Class of 2015 arriving in August 2013 will increase from 20 to 30 students to help offset the decrease resulting from the MCCG/Mercer closure.


Looking Back to See Our Way Forward






