A Word from the "Steel Magnolia"

uring the Annual meeting in Las Vegas I heard CRNA leaders comment how important it is for an AANA President to have the support of their state association. I am grateful for the support and encouragement of my state association. The GANA stood beside me throughout campaigns for elected AANA positions, years of service on the AANA Board and, especially, as President during fiscal year 2013. It was obvious to other AANA leaders my state was always there for me with special touches like flowers in my room during a stressful meeting, hosting a reception in my honor during a national meeting, thoughtful gifts to recognize the moment and campaign calls to get out the vote in close election races. I am proud I could bring the AANA Presidency back to Georgia as the second member of the GANA to serve as AANA President. After a 70-year void, it is a special addition to our 75th Anniversary and I hope to see many of you during the October celebration in Stone Mountain.

There were numerous accomplishments throughout the year and I am pleased with the actions. Not taking our over 90% membership rate for granted, we placed promoting the value of membership as a high priority. Our goal was not just for you to be happy customers but be raving fans! It was especially fun for me to engage members on the various CRNA run list serves. It solidified my preconceived belief, that if CRNAs are given the facts they will engage and make wise decisions.

The Federal Government Affairs division scored 3 huge victories this year. A very favorable final rule authorizing Medicare coverage of all CRNA services in their state scope of practice, including chronic pain management services, a Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) billing clarification that ensures CRNA economic advantage over Anesthesiologist Assistants (AA) by stating services by an AA may not be billed as QZ or non-medically directed as CRNAs are educated and authorized to do and the Medicare agency's proposal to eliminate the requirement that covered bariatric surgery services be performed in accredited Bariatric Centers of Excellence, whose certification guidelines include the requirement that an anesthesiologist provide anesthesia services or supervise anesthesia services when a CRNA delivers the anesthesia care. Having my signature on numerous letters advocating and defending CRNA scope of practice and reputation as qualified, cost-effective, accessible anesthesia providers was rewarding.

Partnership between our state leaders, State Government Affairs and State Management Affairs divisions led to several key state legislative victories and fending off potential negative efforts. Work continues for our state leaders as more of a shift to state scope of practice occurs but organizational assessments are preparing the voluntary leaders with necessary skills and the AANA is ready and willing to support efforts of the state leaders in legislative, regulatory and judicial initiatives.

2013 AANA Annual Meeting

I had the privilege of attending the AANA Annual Meeting where our own Janice Izlar closed out her year as President of the AANA and passed the gavel to Dennis Bless. I was honored to be allowed to participate along with Leslie Jeter in presenting the GANA gift to Janice. As you know Janice has become known as Georgia's "Steel Magnolia". As a leader she displayed the qualities of having the strength of steel, yet being able to be as delicate as a flower. To capture and honor these qualities for Janice, GANA presented her with a Frabel sculpture of a magnolia. We hope this gift will be a lasting reminder that Janice is Georgia's Steel Magnolia. We are very proud of her leadership and accomplishments.

Member Engagement

Once again as GANA goes through its annual election process, the Nominating Committee was challenged with filling the slots on the ballot. Filling the ballot with one or more candidates per position frequently poses a problem. So why do we have trouble engaging our membership? I suppose that only the members can answer that question, but member engagement is a topic getting a lot of attention by organization analysts. Volunteerism is down across the board. According to a United States Bureau of Labor Statistics publication dated February 2013, "Volunteering in the United States" overall volunteerism was down in 2012 by 0.3 percentage points over 2011. The figures for various age groups showed declines steeper than the overall dip. The groups with the biggest declines were the age groups over 45 and those between 20 to 24 years of age.

It is tough to engage members when everyone's life is full of family and work obligations and there is precious little time left over for relaxation and/or fun. This year GANA made some adjustments in the way it conducts business as a direct result of recognizing the personal needs of its members who volunteer to serve. It initiated an electronic newsletter to replace the paper copy of the To & Fro; and held its first virtual Board Meeting. Both of these changes have been well-received. The Board continues to investigate ways to attract more members to serve and who will remain more active in the association. We would like to build a pathway that will attract new interest in actively serving GANA and get people to stay engaged. Please help us with this effort. Let us know if you are interested in being actively involved, such as serving on a committee or running for a seat on the Board. The next board meeting will be held on Saturday October 5th during the Fall Anniversary Meeting. Please join us and give us the answers as to how we can increase member engagement. Tell us what it would take for you to convert from an observer to an actively engaged member.

Legislative and Regulatory Issues

GANA continues to monitor the fall-out from HB 178. The Georgia Composite Board of Medical Examiners has created a pain management committee in response to its responsibility granted by HB 178. Proposed rules have been published for review and comments and will be considered at a hearing on October 10, 2013. A copy of the proposed rules can be found at GCMB website. The passage of HB 178 during last legislative session was a setback for CRNAs. A group of affected and interested CRNAs will continue to address this issue until the restriction placed on CRNAs' scope of practice by HB 178 is removed. Past president Rose Synsmir and her committee have planned a wonderful event full of education and celebration. Trust me you do not want to miss this event!

Now I will discuss where I feel we need to go in the future. We have been very fortunate to have some talented individuals willing to run for office and serve on committees and we have the best executive director/legal counsel of any state, but there needs to be more involvement from others. If you look at this year's GANA ballot, you will see many positions with only one person running. To be honest, we were lucky to get one person for each position! The biggest threat facing GANA today in my opinion is lack of membership involvement,

While in Nevada representing GANA and its members, several Board members and non-board members heard much debate regarding bylaw changes and voting on them. As not to be repetitive, the results can be found on the AANA website.

At the August GANA Board of Directors meeting, one CRNA member at large attended. Thirty students from GRU attended. What's the deal? According to the GA BON, Georgia has 1851 CRNAs. I realize 1851 can't attend at the same time. However, we have a hard enough time getting members to attend the Fall Meeting and Business meetings while earning CEUs. By the way, that meeting (75th anniversary of GANA) is 04-06 October at the Evergreen Marriott Resort in Stone Mountain Park this year. I appreciate the members that cover my (and other Board members and officers) call or duties when GANA responsibilities arise. When GANA leaders addressed the potential implications for patient access to pain management and some of the practice right concerns to the Legislators, it was said they heard no opposition from their

constituents. Most importantly, the passing of this legislation can place limits of patient access to care for pain management. This directly affected the scope of practice for some CRNAs. HB 178 now essentially puts power into the hands of the Georgia Composite Medical Board to determine the all rules and regulations related to pain management services. This is where professionals and the public may feel the effect of this Bill due to access of care issues. This is a prime example as to why CRNAs need to have ongoing relationships with their local legislators. I understand some people think they cannot talk to politicians. If you can't call them, you need to write to them. You must have your leaders know who you are and your position about key issues. It is sometimes crucial for your patients or someone you may know, as well as yourself.

In closing, please attend the GANA Fall Meeting in Stone Mountain in October, and when called to contact your legislator, don't put it off because bills can be voted on the next day. Thank you for allowing me to represent and serve your GANA as president-elect this year.

Capitol Hill Update

Defore I start out mentioning some of the major accomplishments over the last year provided by you, the Federal Government Affairs staff and the AANA I would like to try and answer the question I unfortunately hear a lot of, "Why be an AANA member and why give to your Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetist Political Action Committee (or CRNA-PAC)?". My fellow CRNAs and SRNAs, it's all about "Advocacy" and your right to practice as you do. The AANA along with the CRNA-PAC advocates for CRNAs concerning issues such as patient safety, access to quality healthcare services, scope of practice, educational funding, reimbursement, and many other legislative and regulatory matters. As such, the AANA tracks state and federal legislation and regulation affecting nurse anesthesia practice, develops and carries out federal grassroots lobbying efforts, coordinates meetings with federal legislators and agency officials, testifies at federal and state legislative and regulatory hearings, and educates CRNAs and state associations regarding effective advocacy strategy and practice. Did you know that \$232.50 of your AANA membership dues goes back to your state. Without your support the states could not function as they do. In summary, CRNAs would not exist and practice as they do today without the membership's financial support through annual dues and giving to the CRNA-PAC. Our scope of practice would be non-existent, we would practice as AAs do!

One of the major accomplishments over the past year by your AANA was the AANA-backed Medicare CRNA Pain Rule authorizing direct reimbursement of all Medicare CRNA services within their state scope of practice which took effect January 1, 2013. Another was the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) clarified and confirmed that anesthesiologist assistants (AAs) may not bill Medicare for non-medically directed (billing code QZ) anesthesia services as CRNAs are educated and authorized to do. The action taken by CMS represents an important development in anesthesia services coverage, clarifying what we already know: that CRNA and AA educational preparation and services are not the same, and that the Medicare program recognizes them differently. While Medicare recognizes CRNA services provided autonomously and with anesthesiologist medical direction, in contrast, the agency only recognizes AA services under anesthesiologist medical direction.

One of the current big issues we are facing now is permanently repealing the sustainable growth rate (SGR) cuts and reforming Medicare payment. By a 51-0 vote on July 31, the House Energy and Commerce Committee approved legislation repealing Medicare sustainable growth rate (SGR) funding formula cuts and reforming Medicare payment (HR 2810). The result is stabilizing Medicare Part B payment for five years with 0.5

percent annual increases. The legislation is not final. It awaits action in the House Ways and Means Committee in the fall following Congress' August recess. That committee has the job of identifying and approving the revenue source to pay the costs of HR 2810, and possibly of adding entitlement reforms. The full House appears unlikely to take up the bill until November at the earliest.

Of other interest is the AANA-backed Provider Nondiscrimination provision that is under attack by organized medicine. Rep. Andy Harris (R-MD), the only anesthesiologist in Congress, introduced the bill, HR 2817, on July 24 with the backing of the American Society of Anesthesiologists (ASA). Under the Provider Nondiscrimination provision of the Affordable Care Act (ACA), which takes place January 1, 2014, health plans may not discriminate against qualified licensed providers solely on the basis of their licensure. It will help to expand patient access to safe and high-quality healthcare and help to control or reduce overall healthcare costs through market competition. This will have a huge impact on states like AL and NC, which currently deny or severely impair coverage by CRNAs for the same services as provided by anesthesiologists.

For those of you in leadership positions or those considering leadership positions in the GANA or AANA please consider attending the AANA Fall Leadership Academy in Miami Beach, FL on November 8-10. This meeting is designed to provide detailed information for those interested in the following areas; State Government Relations, Federal Political Director, State President-Elect, State Reimbursement Specialist, AANA Foundation, Leadership and Media Spokes-Person Training for State Association leaders. I encourage all members of the board, particularly those that are interested in moving up the ladder, to attend this meeting. You can register online at www.aana.com.

The next Mid-Year Assembly will be April 6-9, 2014 at the Crystal Gateway Marriott in Arlington, Va. Make plans now to join us in Washington, DC to learn about the current legislative issues that affect CRNAs and the tools to take it to Capitol Hill and advocate for our profession.

I encourage you all to utilize the following resources that provide up to date information concerning state and federal news that affects you. On the homepage of the GANA website (www.gana.org) you have access to the "Advocacy" tab which provides state and federal information concerning CRNAs, "Care to be Counted" logo where you can also give to your CRNA-PAC and finally "Like Us" on GANA Facebook where I try to provide you day to day general information important to CRNAs. The GANA 2013-2014 ballot has been delivered. Please vote! I hope to see you all at the GANA 75th Annual Meeting and Gala on October 4-6 at the Evergreen Marriott Resort and Conference Center at Stone Mountain. ■

Protect Your Practice Rights

Greetings! As we head toward our annual meeting in Stone Mountain and the 75th anniversary of the GANA I would like to remind you of the GANA PAC and the importance it plays in protecting your practice rights. Please stop by and donate to the GANA PAC!

One item of federal legislation that we need you to know about and also need you to contact your representatives about is H.R. 2817. HR 2817 was created by Dr. Andy Harris, MDA of Maryland. The bill has a five percent chance of passing committee and less than one percent chance of passing. If enacted, H.R. 2817 would repeal Section 2706(a), Title XXVII of the Public Health Service Act. According to The Patients' Access to Responsible Care Alliance (PARCA), "This provision, based on policy supported by bipartisan leaders for more than a decade and ultimately included as part of the 2010 Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, serves to bar health plans from "discriminating with respect to participation under the plan or coverage against any health care provider who is acting within the scope of that provider's license or certification under applicable State law." This provision prohibits health plans from discriminating against entire classes of qualified licensed healthcare professionals, such as non-MD/DO providers, solely on the basis of their licensure. Under this provision, health insurers can still address provider network quality and sufficiency for the availability of healthcare benefits to their enrollees. Limiting patient access to and choice of qualified, licensed and certified health care providers reduces competition and

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concentrates market share resulting in generating economic benefit for other providers and ultimately increasing cost for consumers. Non-MD/DO professionals provide high-value, cost-effective care — and consumers should have the ability to choose their health care providers. Limiting patient access to and choice of qualified, licensed and certified non-MD/DO health care providers as H.R. 2817 intends, would further reduce competition and concentrate market share and economic benefit into the hands of select providers — a misguided policy that would increase costs for consumers and the delivery system as a whole."

We need you to contact your representatives in congress and urge them to oppose H.R. 2817. ■

Wellness from Las Vegas

As usual the annual AANA meeting was exhausting. This time I went with the attitude "I can't do everything, just try to enjoy what you do do". I was fairly successful, still had to get that 45 minute nap every day.

One of my interests was to attend the **Critical Incidents** and Adverse Events Open Forum. It was a first and very well attended, mostly dealing with the "second victim" in medically induced trauma. These <u>incidents</u> can happen to our patients, family members, or friends. They have found that the care takers are the "second victims" and can exhibit signs and symptoms as mild as depressed mood to full-blown PTSD. Symptoms can appear either right away or in the future ... and they can manifest as drug and alcohol abuse. This type of incident can happen in your personal life or in your practice; and affect your ability to perform your anesthetics in the immediate aftermath as well as in the future if not tended to immediately after the incident.

I know personally that as a younger practitioner I felt like I could handle anything; I was invincible. But, I do remember everything about the patient that died while we (the healthcare team) tried to operate on her ruptured aneurysm. After all these years I remember the personnel that were present and physical description of the patient. The only thing I don't remember is the patient's name. The point is that these types of incidents are imprinted in our brain and affect self-esteem, ability to practice, judgment, sleep, unprovoked irritability(or just plain anger), and actually your total well-being. The forum I attended in Las Vegas opened Pandora's Box, and just showed us another reason to question our ability to cope on the job.

Go to the AANA/Wellness/Adverse Events/Bad Outcomes/How to Cope. It will take you to the MITSS. org (Medically Induced Trauma Support Services) website where you can look at videos of patients and clinicians affected by their particular medical trauma. They also have a downloadable tool kit for coping. One of the tools that jumped out at me was talking to a professional immediately after the incident. If you don't have this service available at your place of work, designated Employee Assistance Program (EAP)/or some form of it, seek it out in your community. One of the speakers at the forum had to write his patient (against the hospital's advice) a letter telling her of his remorse and apologizing for his actions in the incident, and that letter was written after a considerable length of time. A lecture followed this forum, 'The Aftermath of Perioperative Catastrophes: Our (CRNAs) Voices are Finally Heard!' It reinforced the need for the MITSS toolkit. It also reinforced that fact that drugs and alcohol are not the coping mechanism we need to be using. Check out the websites, it is good viewing. PTSD isn't just for war veterans; I could see a lot of me in their stories. You will hear more on this subject, because it does have a huge impact on our wellness. It was a great meeting for wellness activities.

I hope we see you at Stone Mountain for the 75th Anniversary GANA meeting. Peer Assistance/ Wellness will be there.

In conclusion, it was a privilege to watch Janice succeed in her year as our AANA President. She represented us well, and you can be proud.


Sunday morning's topics discuss the role of the CRNA in Pain Management and newer developments in pain therapies. As always, ample time is provided for discussion and attendee input.



The new bylaws give the Board of Directors of the AANA greater flexibility in dealing with Association business. The 2013-2014 Board of Directors is committed to do what is in the best interest of you the members and this great Association we all have.

Our relationship with the ASA, unfortunately, has not improved. In response to an Op-Ed piece written by one of our members from Florida and published on the Hill Blog in Washington, the President and President-Elect from the ASA wrote a response in which they called CRNAs "unsafe." In her eloquent response, President Izlar did not hold back. She stood up for all of us in a written response that was too long in coming. To read all of the details, I hope you will go to the front page of the Members Only side of the AANA website and read all of the responses. We cannot allow the ASA to drag the members of this association through the mud without a strong response. We had a series of very positive outcomes this year on the Federal level, according to Mr. Frank Purcell, Senior Director of Federal Governmental affairs. These included:

- Medicare released a final rule recognizing <u>ALL</u>
 CRNA services within their state scope of practice, including chronic pain management services;
- Medicare clarified that the QZ modifier denoting non-medically directed CRNA services may not be used for AA services;
- Medicare transmitted to MACs that the rural passthrough program can reimburse all CRNA services within their scope, not just anesthesia care; and,
- AANA's State Reimbursement Specialist initiative is identifying, training and mobilizing CRNAs to learn and advocate for reimbursement issues by state.

We must always be vigilant to the attempts to limit our scope of practice and we must always defend our right to a full scope of practice.

If you have never gone to the Fall Leadership Academy, it is coming up November 8 – 10 in Miami, Florida. This is an opportunity to acquire the skills necessary for organization governance and association best practices. It is intended for established as well as developing state and national leaders. Our new track this year will be directed toward acquiring the skills necessary to be an effective State Reimbursement Specialist (actually, skills all of us could use in the future).
